We're allowed 200 14 15 square feet. 16 The only other change -- we kept this 17 one graphic at the "To Go" door, and then we removed the 61 square foot sign that was here. 18 So we're at 200 square feet again. That's the 19 only difference. 20 21 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Bryant Cocks, 22 Planning Consultant, did you have a chance to 23 review this? MS. WALYGA: No. 24 25 MR. COCKS: I didn't get a chance to

I'm here tonight requesting that the 8 9 Board consider amending a condition of its 10 approval for the Mountain Lake Subdivision. DONNELLY: The application before 11 you is not for development of this particular 12 property but rather for a permit that the Town 13 Code provides for the property's owner to harvest 14 trees, cut down timber on the property. In a 15 moment you'll see a description of where that is, 16 how much and how it will be accomplished. The 17 purpose of the public hearing is to hear from 18 you, the members of the public. By order of the Planning 8 9 Board of Town of Newburgh. John P. Ewasutyn, 10 Chairman, Planning Board Town of Newburgh. Dated June 27, 2012." 11 12 MR. BROWNE: Thank you. Frank Galli 13 will give the status of the mailings. 14 MR. GALLI: The notice of publication 15 and the hearing was published in The Mid-Hudson 16 Times and The Sentinel. The applicant mailed out 17 49 registered letters, 36 were signed for and 18 came back, 3 were undeliverable. The mailings are all in order. 19 20 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Thank you. Would 21 you make your presentation. 22 MR. PRENTIS: Good evening. My name is 23 Chris Prentis, Lower Hudson Forestry Services. 24 I'm here tonight to present an application for

timber harvesting, 21 acres of a 40.4 acre lot.

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As you said, 160 trees marked and about 7.5 trees per acre.

The public notice did say it was 21 acres of clearing. I do want to make clear that this is not clearing, this is not development, it is all vegetation, stumps. There will be no excavating. Everything will be retained that is not marked in the woods.

10 Access will be made off of Union Ave 11 Extension. The parcel has a 53-foot wide 12 right-of-way that goes back into the lot. The 13 Town's highway supervisor has approved the 14 entrance, and it will be graveled and opened up, 15 and then at the end of the project it will be 16 closed back up so cars or anything else can not 17 get back in there.

The harvester will be using a current road, an old woods road that was in there, an old farm road. At the completion of the job, the landing area, the access road and all the skid trails and wood roads will be cleaned, smoothed off and allowed to be naturally revegetated.

I also brought some location maps and then zoomed-in maps for the public if they want

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 22 2 to take a look. You're going to probably have to share. That's the location. 3 Once the trees are cut, all tops will 4 be loped down to a height of less than three feet 5 to allow to naturally decay in the woods. 6 The hours of operation, days of operation will be 7 in compliance with the Town's Code. 8 9 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: For the record, do 10 you know the days that are permitted by the Town 11 Code and the hours of operation? 12 MR. PRENTIS: I don't. That's one 13 thing I do want to find out tonight. Typically 14 it's 7 to 7 Monday through Saturday, but it does 15 vary a little bit from town to town. I just wanted to make sure what it is for this Town. 16 17 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Jerry, would you know offhand? 18 MR. CANFIELD: I believe it is. I can 19 20 look right now, though. 21 MR. HINES: The duration of the 22 project, for the public, how long will it take to harvest these 160 trees? 23 24 MR. PRENTIS: Depending on conditions, weather, when he does start, it shouldn't take 25

2 more than three weeks.

3 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Questions from Board4 Members?

5 MR. FOGARTY: Chris, you're going to be 6 going into 21 of the 40 acres to get these 160 7 trees. Are there any other side roads? How do 8 you go in and get the tree out? Is there any 9 damage done to the other areas in order for you 10 to get into that acre to get the designated tree 11 cut down?

12 MR. PRENTIS: To get into it will be 13 temporary roads which are called skid roads that 14 the skidder will go in, hook on to a tree, two or 15 three at a time, and then pull out to the landing area which will be located near Union Ave. But 16 they're not permanent roads, they're not 17 bulldozed in or anything like that. Damage will 18 be kept to a minimum. 19

20 MR. FOGARTY: Do you know, are there 21 any other plans, besides this one, to do any 22 further harvesting in this area down the road 23 or is this it?

24 MR. PRENTIS: Well, depending on what 25 the landowner's objective is. I know originally

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2 his objective was to develop the property. He's 3 decided against that. So, you know, if he does want to harvest and he still owns the property in 4 5 fifteen or twenty years, there would still be plenty of trees left to do that. 6 MR. FOGARTY: I knew very little about 7 this. I read some of the articles. One of the 8 9 things they talk about is a stewardship that the 10 people who own the property now have to be 11 concerned down the road, in a hundred years, what 12 it's going to look like. Is there any plan to 13 replant any trees? MR. PRENTIS: No. In the northeast 14 15 tree planting after harvesting is not done. It's 16 all natural regeneration. MR. FOGARTY: Okay. Thank you. 17 18 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Any other questions? John Ward? 19 20 MR. WARD: What's the procedure on 21 picking out the trees and marking? How do you 22 know if you're taking ten in one spot or is there 23 a procedure? 24 MR. PRENTIS: The procedure is 25 typically trees that are hardwood trees in the

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES

northeast that are over 20 inches in diameter are 2 typically viewed as financially mature. 3 So depending on the objective of what the landowner 4 5 wants, those trees are typically marked. Trees with poor form, crooks or rot in them are also 6 7 marked for removal. Then to select other trees, if you know that you have a nice formed, in this 8 9 area mainly red oak or white oak and you want to 10 retain that for the next harvest, you free up 11 around that tree to allow it to grow. That's 12 typically how you choose.

13 MR. WARD: And my other question is say 14 you have allotted the trees that you want all in 15 one area and you have like a bald spot, a hole, 16 how does that work? Do you skip and maybe pick 17 another tree or try to keep it?

MR. PRENTIS: You know, again it depends on what the owner, his objective. A small four or five-tree area that if you took all four or five of them, you know, a bald spot you're talking is probably only a fifth of an acre. So, you know, that opens it up and it will naturally revegetate.

17	the trucks?
18	MR. PRENTIS: They usually pull them
19	out when they have enough to have a truckload of
20	them, then they bring the truck in. So, you
21	know, they don't wait until all of them are on
22	the ground to start pulling them out.
23	MR. GALLI: The traffic pattern is
24	going to be down Union Avenue to 300?
25	MR. PRENTIS: Yes.

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 27 2 MR. GALLI: Do they plan on having this done before school starts? 3 MR. PRENTIS: His intention is to start 4 immediately, so it should be -- it should be done 5 before school starting, somewhere around the 1st 6 7 of September. MR. MENNERICH: The parts of the trees 8 9 that you don't take that are left there, what's 10 your process for handling that? 11 MR. PRENTIS: Quite a bit of the tree 12 that's not going to be a log is actually going to be used for firewood, and then the remainder is 13 14 loped and crushed down to usually knee high or 15 lower, and then it's allowed to naturally decay. 16 MR. MENNERICH: Thank you. 17 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Comments from the 18 public? As Mike Donnelly had said earlier, if you'd raise your hand and give your name and 19 20 address please. 21 The gentleman in the back. 22 MR. WOODRUFF: Frank Woodruff, 23 W-O-O-D-R-U-F-F. Your staging area is going to be here? 24 25 MR. PRENTIS: Yes, sir.

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 28 2 MR. WOODRUFF: Well that's only -- my house is only eight foot from the property line. 3 I want to know what kind of impact it's going to 4 5 have on my yard, the trucks going in and out. MR. PRENTIS: Well, we can push it 6 7 back. The square is not -- it's not going to be exactly on the line. 8 9 MR. WOODRUFF: Right. What I'm saying 10 is, you know, I don't have much room, eight feet 11 from my house to the line. 12 MR. GALLI: Could you show us where 13 your house is, or his house, on the map, roughly? 14 MR. HINES: It's right in that lower 15 left corner there. 16 MR. GALLI: Where is the staging area 17 going to be? 18 MR. WOODRUFF: Right here. CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Chris, why was that 19 20 chosen as the staging area? 21 MR. PRENTIS: Because that's really the 22 only access that would work. He does have two 23 access points but the other access point leads to 24 a stream. So this was the only area that was 25 open and would work for a truck and for a

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 29 2 skidder. MR. GALLI: Is there another spot that 3 they could go for the staging? They're just 4 going to leave the logs there? They just stack 5 them up? 6 MR. PRENTIS: They just stack them. 7 MR. GALLI: And then the truck comes in 8 9 and picks them up. The truck doesn't stay there 10 a week or two? 11 MR. PRENTIS: No. Once the truck is 12 loaded it leaves. MR. GALLI: So it comes in that day, 13 14 loads that day, probably a couple hours loaded, 15 and off it goes? MR. PRENTIS: Typically in forty-five 16 17 minutes to an hour it's gone. MR. GALLI: So it's not even an hour? 18 19 MR. PRENTIS: Yeah. I'd be willing to 20 work something out where we could push it back as 21 far as we can towards the back corner of your 22 property. You know --23 MR. WOODRUFF: That's where it widens 24 out, too. 25 MR. PRENTIS: Right. I don't have a

2	problem with doing that. Just for the other
3	access, I don't have another option.
4	MR. GALLI: Not with the stream.
5	MR. WOODRUFF: Thank you.
6	MR. PRENTIS: Yup.
7	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: What's the height
8	of the logs when they're staged there? How high
9	are they stacked?
10	MR. PRENTIS: Usually six, seven foot.
11	So not terribly high.
12	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Additional comments
13	from the public?
14	MR. KODILANEN: Rich Kodilanen,
15	K-O-D-I-L-A-N-E-N.
16	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: First name?
17	MR. KODILANEN: Richard. I'm on the
18	other side of the 53-foot right-of-way. I'm
19	concerned about how many vehicles and how large
20	are going to be coming out of there. Union
21	Avenue is very, very narrow and you have a wide
22	right turn to go down to 300.
23	MR. PRENTIS: The only vehicles will be
24	the log truck and the logger's pick-up truck.
25	MR. KODILANEN: How large is that log

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 31 2 truck? MR. GALLI: Usually about 40 feet, 3 aren't they? 4 5 MR. PRENTIS: Yeah. I don't have an exact. He has more than one truck. They're 6 usually about 40, 45 foot. 7 MR. KODILANEN: How many pieces of 8 9 equipment per day are going to be operating in 10 there besides the skid steer? 11 MR. PRENTIS: That's it. MR. KODILANEN: A chainsaw? 12 MR. PRENTIS: No, just chainsaws. 13 MR. KODILANEN: We don't know the hours 14 15 of operation yet from code compliance? 16 MR. GALLI: Jerry. CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: I think he's looking 17 at it now, Richard. 18 19 MR. KODILANEN: Because my main -- it 20 is a residential area. It's not a forest. 21 Everyone -- there's a lot of kids in the area, 22 everyone has to work. We don't like having a lot 23 of noise, like trucks coming in at 6:00 in the 24 morning to start and staying until 7:00 at night. It's a definite residential area. You have every 25

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2 right to do it.

1

Another concern is invading the wetlands. That's a little bit further south. When he was in there previous five years ago he was doing some holes digging. He just tore down every stonewall, every stream he could find. It is definitely a designated wetland and we don't want to see that ruined.

10 MR. PRENTIS: Like I said, there is no 11 harvesting in the wetlands. You know, the 12 remaining 19 acres or so, the reason why we're 13 not harvesting is because they're wetlands, so --

MR. KODILANEN: Is that going to be watched at all by the DEC or that's just you? MR. HINES: There's actually two areas proposed where there's no harvesting. It's the front area along Union Avenue with the exception of the access road and the land.

20 Chris, I believe your map shows -- your 21 small scale U.S.G.S. map does show some 22 harvesting within the wetland adjacent area and 23 possibly within the wetland. That's permitted by 24 the DEC. Selected harvesting is not a regulated 25 activity in the wetlands. If there's

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 33 1 2 merchantable timber in there, it can be selectively harvested. They can't clear cut in 3 the wetlands, but with 160 trees over 21 acres 4 it's not by any stretch a clear cut, especially 5 if they are limiting themselves to 16 inches or 6 7 larger. There may be some trees in that wetland 8 adjacent area, at least based our map. That map 9 shows the designated wetlands. The shaded area, 10 the hatched area is the buffer, at least in 2001. 11 MR. PRENTIS: There are trees in the 12 buffer, but, you know, once you get into --MR. HINES: If you hit wetland you're 13 14 going to stop. 15 MR. PRENTIS: Once you get into the wet areas there's no trees. 16 MR. KODILANEN: One other concern. I 17 was back there. You have a nice 20-inch tree, 8 18 other smaller trees. In order to cut down that 19 20 20-inch tree you're going to have to destroy all 21 those other trees in that one spot. That's going 22 to exceed your 7.5 trees per acre. 23 MR. PRENTIS: Well, you know, it's --24 you're typically -- if you go and mark 160 trees

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and you harvest 160 trees, you always figure

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2 you're going to probably either break, knock down or damage a tree, you know, typically probably 5, 3 6 extra. So, you know, over the course of 160 4 5 you're looking at a percent or two over. It's typical. I mean it doesn't matter if you use the 6 chain saw or the machine. 7 MR. KODILANEN: That's my concern. 8 9 You're going to leave a big hole here and not 10 even 12 feet away there's another 18-inch tree 11 with the same situation. We're going to have a 12 big hole here, 12 feet away another big hole. MR. PRENTIS: Well the logger is going 13 14 to try everything he can to prevent damage --MR. KODILANEN: To those other areas. 15 MR. PRENTIS: Yeah. As I mentioned, in 16 17 15 or 20 trees, if we do come back it behooves you to have those trees undamaged because then 18 they're merchantable. 19 20 MR. KODILANEN: I think that's it. 21 Okay. Thank you. 22 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Is there anything in the code that talks about the hours of 23 24 operation and the days? MR. CANFIELD: Yes. That's found in 25

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2 the noise and illumination chapter, which is Chapter 125 of the Municipal Code. The hours of 3 operation are to be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday 4 5 through Saturday. I might add, too, that should the Board choose to approve this application, the 6 7 Board can limit the time of expiration on the permit, maximum not to exceed one year. 8 That's 9 in Chapter 83.

10 MR. PRENTIS: You know, if noise and 11 hours of operation are a concern, I've done it 12 with other towns, especially on Saturday. If 13 people are very concerned about that, we just don't work on Saturday. So I mean that's --14 15 Monday through Friday, 7 to, it does say 7 at 16 night but typically 5:00 they're done. But 17 Saturdays I don't have a problem with. То appease the neighbors, I don't have a problem 18 19 with that.

20 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Richard, does that 21 satisfy one of your requests?

22 MR. KODILANEN: Yes. It's a very 23 personal neighborhood. We're all neighbors here. 24 As long as Chris is willing to work with us, 25 that's fine. No one mows their lawn before 9:00.

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 36 2 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Especially in the last week or two. 3 MR. KODILANEN: I haven't mowed mine in 4 5 two weeks, let me tell you. CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Again, Mike, would 6 you make note of that in the resolution? 7 MR. DONNELLY: Yes. Do you want to 8 9 also place a duration on the permit, up to a 10 year? 11 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Would that satisfy 12 you? MR. KODILANEN: Yes. 13 14 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Additional 15 questions or comments from the public? 16 MR. GREENE: Dominick Greene, 17 G-R-E-E-N-E, 25 Chapel Road. A couple questions. How many total movements of the logging truck do 18 you anticipate at this time for the 160 trees? 19 20 MR. PRENTIS: For 160 trees, somewhere 21 between 6 and 8. 22 MR. GREENE: Will you be using a 23 trailer attached to the truck or will it just be 24 the logging truck itself? 25 MR. PRENTIS: I believe he does use a
LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 trailer. So it would be the truck and the 2 trailer. 3 MR. GREENE: So the truck, based on 4 5 DOT, is usually 40 tons. The trailer is another 20 tons. We have Union Avenue that's only been 6 built to handle 9 tons. If you damage the road 7 will you take responsibility to rebuild the road, 8 and can the Planning Board put that as a 9 10 requirement? 11 MR. DONNELLY: That's not in our Code, 12 no. It's not the Town's road. MR. GREENE: Union Avenue is a Town 13 14 road. 15 MS. GREENE: Union Avenue is a Town 16 road. 17 MR. DONNELLY: You're correct. MR. PRENTIS: The highway supervisor 18 19 has looked at the site and I told him what the 20 intention was, and he didn't have a problem with 21 the truck weight on that road. MR. GREENE: Well, I have a lot of 22 23 experience, and that is a problem with weights on the Town roads. You could be moving 60 tons on a 24 9 ton road. 25

2	The hours that you're planning on
3	transporting the logs could vary throughout the
4	day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.?
5	MR. PRENTIS: Mm'hm'.
6	MR. GREENE: My next point is there's
7	approximately anywhere between 10 and 20 school
8	buses. If you're not done by the first day of
9	school would you only do your trucks after school
10	buses have left the area?
11	MR. PRENTIS: Yeah. I've done that
12	before. Limit trucking to say 10 in the morning
13	until 1 in the afternoon. That wouldn't be a
14	problem if it does overrun.
15	MR. GREENE: Thank you.
16	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: The lady.
17	MS. GREENE: Elizabeth Greene. First
18	of all, Union Avenue, a Town road, it is only the
19	width of the paved road. It is a road by use.
20	It is not where we have shoulders and all like
21	that. It's an old cow path I think that
22	eventually got paved just for that particular
23	width. It is a very busy road from 7:15 to about
24	9:00, forgetting school buses. It is a great
25	cut-through for many people heading down, wanting

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2 to avoid the traffic light at Holtz Corners and things like that. I'm very concerned, and I have 3 to say, and I have had Town residents chastise me 4 5 that I happen to be, they guess, the only one who ever goes 30 miles-an-hour, the speed limit. 6 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's true. 7 MS. GREENE: Thank you. So I'm 8 9 thinking of cars coming along there at 45 and 50 10 miles-an-hour to come around that bend and have 11 that logging truck and the trailer behind it as a big surprise to them, and for them to be able to 12 13 slow down and be able to stop, because when the 14 police run their radar there they have a field 15 day. So that's one of my concerns about your 16 hours. 17 The other thing that I wanted to ask, 18 you talked about the trees there, that some of them would be used for firewood. Would that be 19 20 carted away to be sold at other locations? You 21 said that remaining limbs and trimmings and 22 things like that, that you felt that it would be then sold for firewood. Would that be from that 23

site or are they going to haul it away to sell

25

it?

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 2 MR. PRENTIS: No. It's hauled away. 3 MS. GREENE: It's hauled away. MR. PRENTIS: It's log lengths. There 4 5 would be no processing of firewood on the site, splitting or anything like that. 6 7 MS. GREENE: And you talked about damaged trees and all like that that would be 8 9 taken down. Those damaged trees, that would be 10 part of your 160? 11 MR. PRENTIS: They would be in excess. 12 MS. GREENE: They would be in excess. 13 So in essence, for what you're planning, really 14 160 trees is not the total that you would be 15 taking from that property is what you're telling 16 us? 17 MR. PRENTIS: 160 trees are marked with blue paint. 18 MS. GREENE: Okay. But it does not 19 20 mean that 160 trees is the only number of trees. 21 The other thing, in looking at your map 22 here, both of the spots to go into the property 23 are marked that it's wetlands first before you 24 get to where it opens up. How are you addressing 25 going through the wetlands and possibly tearing

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LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 2 it up? MR. HINES: Those are the non-cut 3 areas, those hatch marks on the smaller plan. 4 5 MS. GREENE: Okay. That's not the wetlands? 6 MR. HINES: No. The wetlands are 7 limited to the back of the parcel there. There 8 9 is a stream crossing. We checked the 10 classification for the stream. It is a class C 11 stream, which is an unprotected stream. They do 12 have to meet water quality standards. There's 13 going to be a culvert installed and then removed 14 for that crossing and that proposal. When I looked at it I said that must be 15 16 the wetlands too, and I looked at it last week, 17 which is why I pulled the 12-acre subdivision out, I wanted to see where the wetlands were. 18 The wetland -- DEC regulated wetlands are to the 19 20 rear of the parcel. That area in the front is 21 where there's no trees to be cut other than for 22 the landing and the access road. 23 MS. GREENE: Okay. And I will take 24 this up with our highway superintendent as to 25 what he was looking at when he gave approval, if

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2 he was also looking at the road structure and any damage to that or was he looking at where the 3 cuts were going to be to come out onto Union 4 5 That road, frankly with the two percent Avenue. cap nowadays, I don't have any money -- I'm on 6 7 the Town Board. I don't have any money to spare to repair that road. We just recently sealed it 8 9 and did work onto it. So that is another one of 10 my concerns. But I will be calling Mr. Benedict 11 first thing in the morning.

MR. HINES: We would also suggest possibly some construction crossing signs or truck traffic signs temporarily for the three weeks that you're going to be there, men working type signs, to alert the traveling public that there could be trucks coming out.

18 MR. PRENTIS: Okay.

19 MS. GREENE: Thank you, Mr. Hines.

20 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Okay. The

21 gentleman in the back.

22 MR. GREENE: I apologize for not asking 23 this question earlier. If there's debris on the 24 road, we'll be able to contact you to sweep the 25 road?

9	saying, they would be looking for a response and
10	who is going to be the responsible person?
11	MR. PRENTIS: I can forward the
12	logger's phone number.
13	MR. GREENE: So if there's mud on Union
14	Avenue, that person would have the authority to
15	hire a street sweeper to clean the road?
16	MR. PRENTIS: Well, I mean hire a
17	street sweeper
18	MR. GREENE: Or have one on contract.
19	Have one available.
20	MR. PRENTIS: The intention is
21	MS. GREENE: They can get out there
22	with a broom.
23	MR. PRENTIS: Right, a broom and a
24	shovel. The intention is hopefully there's not
25	going to be any mud with the gravel that's going

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2 to be put down.

MR. DONNELLY: Let me just add one 3 piece. There is a requirement that there be a 4 5 performance guarantee posted with the Town Board, and while that amount, by its terms, may not 6 7 allow repairs to a damaged roadway surface, it clearly would cover the performance of the 8 9 contractor, which would include keeping the 10 roadway clear during the course of construction. 11 So that bonding or that financial security money 12 could be used for the purpose you're referring 13 to.

MR. GREENE: As a neighbor I could contact either Mr. Canfield or Mr. Benedict when the road was covered with debris?

MR. DONNELLY: I think that would be the place to start. If that money needed to be used, that would have to be authorized by the Town Board, but certainly you could start with either the highway superintendent or Mr. Canfield.

23 MR. GREENE: Thank you.

24 MR. CANFIELD: In addition to that, the 25 code compliance department, that's whose

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2 jurisdiction this is to enforce all the regulations and any conditions that the Planning 3 Board may impose upon the applicant. The 4 cleaning of the roads, that is something that our 5 department is responsible to assure that the 6 contractor does maintain. In the event that this 7 application is approved and there is construction 8 9 started, the road becomes muddy or dirty, just 10 call our department and we'll get someone out 11 there. In the past we've had several contractors 12 track mud on our roads. Our police department is 13 very sensitive to that, and generally they 14 contact my office, we send someone out and we get 15 the contractor to clean it up. The contractor, 16 just to put you on notice, we do have the 17 authority to stop all work. So if, you know, we 18 can't come to terms and get the road clean, that's an option of enforcement that we do have. 19 We don't choose to exercise that but it's a 20 21 possibility. 22 MR. PRENTIS: Right.

23 MR. GALLI: Also, this contractor has 24 worked in other towns and they've done a fairly 25 neat job I heard.

3	record. I'm aware of Mr. Prentis working with
4	other municipalities I represent and we have not
5	had an issue.
6	MR. GALLI: Hopefully we don't have an

8	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Ma'am.
9	MS. GREENE: Have you ever done any
10	work in the Town of Newburgh before this?
11	MR. PRENTIS: Yes.
12	MS. GREENE: Can you tell me
13	whereabouts?
14	MR. PRENTIS: Up on Forest Road.
15	MS. GREENE: Okay. And my only other
16	concern is that in essence it says 160 trees but
17	in talking with you I know that that 160 trees is
18	going to be many, many more by the time you get
19	to a certain tree that you've marked or something
20	like that. I really feel very concerned that
21	we're going to be looking at 180 or 200 trees by
22	the time this whole project is completed.
23	MR. PRENTIS: Well
24	MS. GREENE: That's my only other
25	comment.

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2 MR. PRENTIS: -- like I say, every tree 3 is marked at breast height and they're on the stump. So if there's a tree that's cut down that 4 5 wasn't marked, the stump is not going to have paint on it. The contract that the logger signs 6 7 with the landowner states how many trees, and if the logger then decides well I'm going to go and 8 9 cut more, then he's in breach of the contract. 10 My job is to go and look and say why is this 11 stump -- why doesn't it have paint on it and, you 12 know, you put them in line. Like I say, there's 13 going to be two, three, four that get broken. 14 We're not talking big trees, we're talking small 15 trees. When you say 200, absolutely not. That's 16 not the way that it operates. MS. GREENE: As a neighbor there I'll 17

18 be really interested as to how that goes.

19When you say it will reforest in 2020years, I hope my neighbors and I are all there in2120 years.

22 MR. PRENTIS: Well, like I say, it's --23 you can go out and look. There's paint on every 24 one of the stumps.

25 MR. KODILANEN: We can go take

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LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 2 pictures? 3 MR. PRENTIS: It's not my property. MR. KODILANEN: It's not marked no 4 5 trespassing. We can actually go there and see what's going on. 6 MR. PRENTIS: I'm not saying you can 7 trespass. If you want to you can. Everybody is 8 9 in there anyway, so it doesn't matter. I mean 10 there's hunting stands and ATV trails all over 11 the place. 12 MR. KODILANEN: I still ride my motorcycle there. 13 14 MR. CANFIELD: I want to remind you, this is being recorded. You might not want to 15 16 say that. 17 MR. KODILANEN: I whispered that one, Mr. Canfield. 18 19 MR. GALLI: John, a couple more. 20 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: The gentleman in 21 the back. 22 MR. PRESUTTI: Jim Presutti, 23 P-R-E-S-U-T-T-I. For species distribution do you 24 have the species that you're removing? 25 MR. PRENTIS: I don't believe there are

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 2 MR. PRENTIS: The houses along Union Ave, other than I believe your house --3 MS. ECKERT: Is the closest one. 4 5 MR. PRENTIS: -- is about the only 6 place you're going to be able to see any 7 harvesting. The rest of them are going to be back further, 75, 80 feet from the line. And it 8 9 worked out that way simply because from your 10 property line, 60, 70 feet in, it was just 11 grapevine and brush anyway. 12 MR. HINES: It's almost to the stream, 13 if you're aware of where the stream is. From the 14 stream back is where they're cutting, the 15 majority of that is going to be. 16 MR. KODILANEN: You're going to open 17 that 53-foot wide all the way back to your cutting areas for the trucks to come in? 18 MR. PRENTIS: Just to an area where 19 20 they can turn around in. As we discussed, it's 21 going to be somewhere behind your corner in the 22 back. 23 MR. McCARTNEY: Michael McCartney, 19 24 Cindy Lane. I live in the property that's below 25 and at the bottom of where they are harvesting.

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My yard is wet right now. You know the weather 2 we've been having. I'm worried about pulling 3 trees and drainage and more water in my property 4 5 and what's happening with that. That's one thing. I have a lot of concerns. 6 7 My concern with noise is not the concern of the noise in the three weeks it's 8 9 going to take them to harvest 160 trees. My 10 concern is the noise from the Thruway that those 11 trees are blocking, for myself, my neighbors. 12 That's long-term noise that we're all dealing 13 with, okay. 14 My concern is the water. There's a 15 wetlands below where they're harvesting. Silt is 16 going to get into that wetlands. You might as 17 well muddy them up right now. That unprotected stream flows into our reservoir. Silt is going 18 19 to go into that unprotected stream which is going 20

20 into the reservoir. There's a lot of things here 21 that are not being discussed. We're discussing 22 the basics of harvesting.

23Trees protect us against severe24weather, tornadoes and things like that. Trees25protect us against those things. Taking out

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trees, especially older trees which are the ones they want to take out, are going to potentially cause more of that type of weather to be free to come through our neighborhoods and our homes. It's a residential zoning area, my understanding. Tree harvesting is a business. I'm not sure how that works out.

And then a number of times we've asked 9 10 this gentleman about what's the owner's 11 objection, what's the owner's thing, and a lot of 12 things he says he can't say, he's not sure and he 13 doesn't know. So what is the objective here 14 besides harvesting more than 160 trees, because 15 of damage, and what's the long-term effect going 16 to be?

Also, I'm fine with fining a logger 17 18 because he takes down the wrong tree but that doesn't do me any good for 20 years. You all 19 20 know that that money is not going to come to us. 21 It might come to our Town but it's not going to 22 end up in our wallets and it's not going to end 23 up in my ear and things like that. Loggers do 24 take down more trees than they have to. 25 Historically they do take down more trees than

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they said they would, and historically they don't go in with ginger hands and make the harvest. They go in with chain saws and get out whatever is in their way and take out trees. We all know that historically.
CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Pat, do you want to

8 review with us the DEC's position as you said 9 earlier?

10 MR. HINES: The issue I can address is 11 regarding the stormwater. The DEC, and actually 12 the Town has adopted the DEC's model stormwater 13 ordinance, has exempted subcultural activities, 14 forestry operations from their stormwater 15 management regulation. These are specific 16 exemptions that there is no requirements for 17 water quantity, quality control other than the existing water quality standards. They can't 18 make mud, as you said. I'm aware of many 19 20 properties much larger than this that have been 21 logged and there's been no downstream impacts. 22 Actually, when the vegetation grows back to cover 23 in that forested area, there's less runoff 24 because it's more of a grass and flora type of 25 vegetation than trees. There's actually more

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2 vegetation after the removal when it grows back. That's probably the logic behind the DEC 3 exempting these kind of practices, much like they 4 exempt the practice from the wetlands and the 5 buffers. You can't selectively harvest in those. 6 7 I wouldn't anticipate significant downstream impacts based on the DEC's track record with 8 9 those and their specific exemptions from those 10 stormwater regulations.

11 You had before you a plan that had 12 12 residential houses on there that in 2001 through 13 2005 was before this Board. That plan would have 14 removed significantly more than the 160 trees 15 we're talking about and would have had impacts on 16 the watershed that you are concerned about. 17 That's not what we're reviewing here. It's a 18 selective harvest of the trees. It complies, 19 because of those exemptions, with the Town and 20 DEC stormwater regulations. They do have to 21 implement the best management practices for soil erosion and sediment control. The DEC won't 22 23 allow them to silt up that stream.

I'm not a hundred percent sure, I do not believe that stream goes into the reservoir

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56 because of that class C classification. If it

went to the reservoir it would have a class A. 3 4 MR. KODILANEN: I'm talking about the 5 map. MR. HINES: I don't believe that's 6 tributary to the reservoir because tributary to 7 the reservoir would have a class A protected 8 9 water quality requirement with the DEC. I 10 believe that stream doesn't go to the reservoir 11 just because of that. I'm not a hundred percent 12 sure but the DEC would have classified that as 13 class A. 14 MR. KODILANEN: 90 percent of the 15 Town --MR. HINES: I did look at traffic -- I 16 17 ran through. MR. KODILANEN: Not the classification. 18 The fact the stream is on the map and it goes 19 directly into --20 21 MR. HINES: It goes across Chapel Road 22 I know, the stream that we're in front here, and I did run the classification because I wanted to 23 24 check that. 25 MR. KODILANEN: No. I'm talking about

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 57 this stream here. 2 3 MR. HINES: The one in the back in the wetlands? 4 5 MR. KODILANEN: This stream. MR. HINES: The one in the back. Yes, 6 that one does. That's not involved in this 7 harvest, with the exception of some of the buffer 8 9 area. 10 MR. KODILANEN: What I'm saying -- I'm 11 not telling you anything you don't know. Water 12 moves. I'm saying there is a stream that's going to be affected by this harvest that does flow 13 into our reservoir. 14 MR. HINES: Through the wetlands. 15 16 MR. KODILANEN: The stream. If we fill 17 in the wetlands with silt --MR. HINES: I don't believe that's the 18 19 intent. MR. KODILANEN: I don't think it's the 20 21 intent. 22 MR. HINES: There's no removal of the 23 stumps. The stumps stay. They're cut at grade. 24 There's some issues, best management practices, 25 for the trails that have to be implemented.

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2 That's why they have a professional harvester on board here. It's not just a contractor. 3 That's his role here. That's what he gets paid to do. 4 5 MR. PRENTIS: Plus in the project area, 6 topography generally less than 5 percent grade, so, you know, your erosion and sedimentation 7 potential is drastically lower than if you were 8 9 working on a hillside. 10 MR. KODILANEN: My home is at the 11 bottom of the hillside. Like I said before, it's 12 I don't know how wet it's going to be wet now. later if there's no trees there. And we're in a 13 14 dry summer right now. 15 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: James, do you want 16 to add anything to this as a forester from 17 experience? MR. PRESUTTI: Not really. I mean he's 18 -- from what I hear, he's doing the management 19 20 practices, he's using the standard. I don't see 21 where there's a problem with anything. 22 I did look at the topography, and, like 23 he said, the grade is minimal. I don't think 24 you'll see a major silt runoff at all from what I see from this here. They're doing it -- they're 25

2	not using mechanical means for cutting. When you
3	use mechanical means for cutting, which are
4	shears and bunkers, then you tend to run more of
5	a problem with that kind of a situation. Here
6	they're going to have men in the woods walking

8	going to be skidding.
9	Are you using a grapple skidder?
10	MR. PRENTIS: Cable.
11	MR. PRESUTTI: Cable skidder. Right
12	there, again, you don't use a cable rather than a
13	grapple skidder that's going to make further
14	marks. Their impact on the environment is going
15	to be minimal at best.
16	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Thank you.
17	Additional comments from the public?
18	(No response.)
19	CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Comments from Board
20	Members. Frank Galli?
21	MR. GALLI: Just the resolution for the
22	approval, I just think we need to put a couple
23	comments about the signs on the road once they're
24	working. I think we ought to limit Monday
25	through Friday, eliminate Saturday, and hopefully

GALLI: Hopefully they're done by then so we don't have that problem. Don't try to 8 limit them now to slow them down. 9 10 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: What would those 11 hours be then? 12 MR. GALLI: During the school year. MR. DONNELLY: I thought I heard 10 to 13 14 1. Did I hear you wrong? MR. PRENTIS: That's what I offered. I 15 16 don't know when the first school bus comes by. 17 MR. GALLI: They're usually done picking up by 9:00, 9:30. 18 MR. PRENTIS: So 10 to 1, 10 to 2, if 19 that would work. 20 21 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Jerry, how does 22 this process work for the public to understand? 23 They make an application to your department under 24 the code, you're responsible to refer it to the Planning Board. So the public understands how 25

2 we reach the point where we are this evening, can 3 you explain that?

4 MR. CANFIELD: Sure. The applicant has submitted what is known as a clearing and grading 5 application which is governed by Chapter 83 of 6 7 our Municipal Code. The criteria for any entity granting that application is based on the amount 8 9 of area to be disturbed or the amount of trees to 10 be cut. In this case, because of the area that's 11 involved, Chapter 83 dictates what level of 12 review that is required and by what entity. Because there's over, I believe it's 5 acres 13 involved in this, it gets referred to the 14 15 Planning Board. Under that plateau the code 16 compliance department is authorized to issue 17 clearing and grading or timber harvest permits, 18 but because this application falls beyond that plateau, it got referred to the Planning Board. 19 20 Also because of the size of the area, which, as 21 Pat has indicated, by nature of this type of 22 project isn't all that large, however it does 23 exceed the plateaus in Chapter 83, that requires 24 the Planning Board to have a public hearing, 25 which is why the people got noticed to come to

2 this public hearing. I should also add that the notice for public hearing was in accordance with 3 the new local law proposal, which is 500 feet, 4 5 which most of you got noticed because of that. Now the application before the Board, we have the 6 7 public hearing, the Board has to now take into consideration its consultants' comments, the 8 advice and concerns presented by the public, the 9 10 Board needs to take that into consideration, and 11 then it's up to the Board's discretion whether to 12 grant this approval. If they so choose to grant 13 an approval, they do have the ability to enforce 14 conditions or stipulations. After that process 15 is complete, the Attorney for the Planning Board will draft what's called a resolution, which is a 16 17 resolution of approval. In that resolution it will list all of the conditions -- any and all of 18 the conditions that the Planning Board may wish 19 to impose. The enforcement of those conditions 20 21 are imposed upon the code compliance department. 22 So items such as we speak, truck traffic and 23 certain hours of operation, are all important 24 items that need to be listed into that 25 resolution. That now becomes the code compliance

Should the application be approved and any one of the public 3 has concerns that some of those conditions or 4 items that they've heard tonight are not adhered 5 6 to, you can contact the code compliance department and they're the ones that will enforce 7 those regulations. 8 9 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Are there any 10 comments or questions the public may have on the 11 presentation that was made by Mr. Canfield? 12 MR. There's a whole list of specific things that need to be complied 6 In addition, Section 83-12 requires a 7 with. financial security be in place to the 8 satisfaction of the Town Board. 9 10 There was discussion and there is 11 authority under 83-8 of the clearing and grading 12 code for limiting the duration of the permit for

13 up to a one-year period, and I will include a 14 condition that limits the activities to one year 15 under the clearing and grading permit.

16 Beyond that, we will need a sign-off 17 letter from the highway superintendent on the weight limit issue. We will need a letter from 18 Pat Hines' office reporting that the landing area 19 20 has been moved back as far as practicable. The 21 applicant's representative has agreed to limit 22 the hours of operation from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. 23 Monday to Saturday. We will include that. 24 MR. FOGARTY: Monday to Friday. 25 MR. DONNELLY: I'm sorry. Monday to

LOWER HUDSON FORESTRY SERVICES 1 74 2 Friday. Yes. No work on Saturdays. I'll include that as a condition. And all logging and 3 truck hauling activity shall take place only 4 5 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Finally, men working signs must be posted to the 6 satisfaction of the town police and/or the 7 highway superintendent. 8 MR. HINES: Let's just say signage. It 9 10 may say trucks or whatever they agree to. 11 MR. DONNELLY: Okay. 12 CHAIRMAN EWASUTYN: Any additional 13 comments or recommendations?
